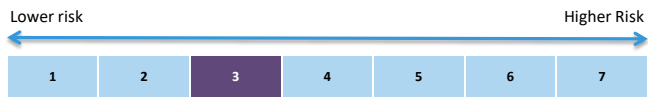

Investment Universe and Investment Objectives

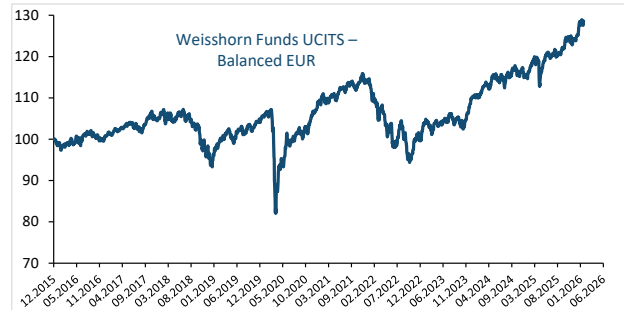

The investment objective of the Sub-Fund is to seek long-term capital growth and income by investing in equities, fixed/floating income instruments, money market instruments, cash equivalents, collective investment schemes pursuing traditional strategies and to a lesser extent alternative strategies UCITS eligible funds. Total equity exposure coming from direct investments or from UCITS with as main investment objective in their issue document to invest in equity will not exceed 50% of the net assets. The Sub-fund is actively managed. The Sub-Fund has no benchmark index and is not managed in reference to a benchmark index.



The Weisshorn Balanced fund is a long term mixed investment vehicle suitable for long term investors (5-year minimum holding horizon). 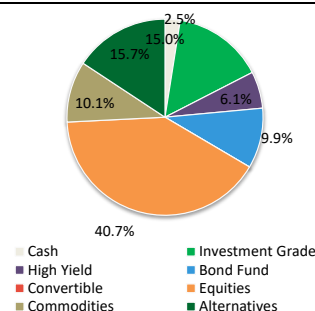

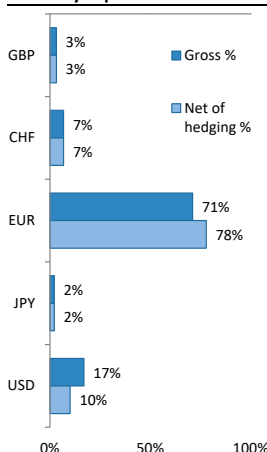

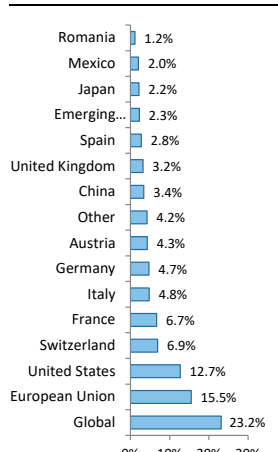

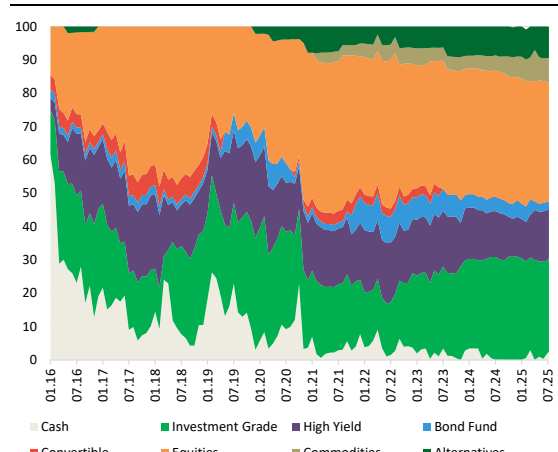
Countries

In June, global financial markets remained broadly resilient, but the month was defined by a sharp repricing of geopolitical and monetary risks. After an intense period of Middle East related stress, investors began to price in some de-escalation, which helped Brent retrace materially and reduced near-term inflation anxiety, even as markets continued to display a fragile but still constructive risk tone. Equities held up better than expected, despite the main indices finishing in the negative territory, except for Europe due to its Financials and Industrials composition. In this context, the MSCI World decreased by -0.69%, the S&P 500 by -0.95%, while the STOXX 600 rose +2.56% and the SPI rose +4.48%, over the period. Long-term rates and Credit spreads remained stable.

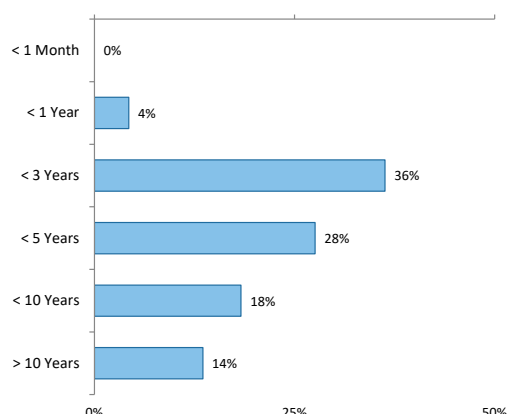
It was also a month in which the inflation debate returned to the forefront. Wholesale inflation surprised to the upside in May, with U.S. PPI rising 1.1% month-on-month and 6.5% year-on-year, reinforcing the message that disinflation is no longer a one-way street. Against that backdrop, the Fed's new chair, Kevin Warsh, adopted a noticeably hawkish tone, with markets concluding that policy is now biased toward keeping rates higher for longer and possibly tightening again later in the year. In Europe, the ECB hiked as expected, but the growth backdrop remained subdued and core inflation stayed sticky enough to preserve a hawkish bias there as well.

Fixed income and credit markets were caught between two conflicting forces: cooling oil prices on the one hand, and a more hawkish policy regime on the other. Treasury yields remained elevated at the long end, the curve continued to flatten, and credit spreads stayed contained, but not because the macro picture improved decisively, rather because markets continued to trust Central Banks for now and because risk premia remained compressed. The main takeaway is that the market continues to trade well, but the balance of risks has become more asymmetric, with inflation persistence, policy hawkishness and geopolitical volatility still capable of triggering abrupt moves. Yield curve flattened during the month, particularly in the US.

At the micro level, the earnings backdrop remained supportive, but breadth stayed uneven and the market still depended heavily on a narrow set of winners. The AI complex continued to dominate performance, while the market also had to digest the growing cost of funding the AI capex cycle, with Hyperscalers issuing more debt and investors becoming more selective on valuation. In Europe, equities managed to grind higher, but the broader picture remained one of modest growth and tighter financial conditions. Japan and China were also important at the micro level. In Japan, equities continued to be strong, mainly due to its heavy exposition to semiconductors. The Yen remained weak and policy normalization continued to matter for markets, while rising long-end yields reinforced the idea that Japan is becoming a more important source of global duration risk. In China, the picture stayed mixed: growth remained uneven, consumer confidence was still fragile, and the market continued to struggle with the balance between policy support and persistent structural weakness.

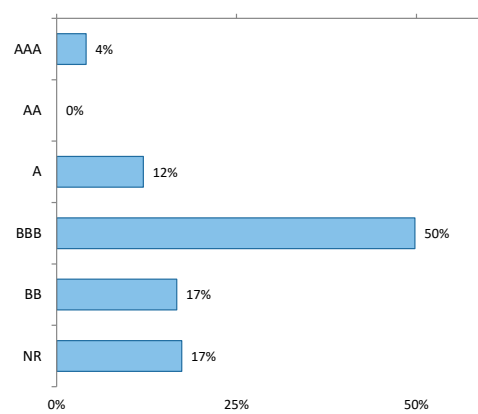
In this environment, the Weisshorn Balanced EUR sub-fund declined by 0.92%. Year-to-date performance stands at +2.61%. Our exposure to Commodities was the main driver of the month's decline. While the Bond pocket (+7 basis points) and the Equity pocket (+8 basis points) contributed slightly, the sharp correction caused by profit-taking in Metals weighed on the month's performance. We remain positive, however, on this thematic, which will continue to benefit from strong demand in the coming years. We took the opportunity to reduce some Equity positions that have performed very well such as Leonardo, as well as our exposure to Japan.

Frontier markets: Within emerging markets, those that are particularly small, new or under-developed.

Commodities: A category that includes metals, building materials, fuels and food ingredients.

Alpha: Alpha shows the percentage performance of a fund above or below that explained by its exposure to the broader market.

Beta: Beta shows the average extent a fund's return moves relative to the broader market. A fund with a beta above 1 moves on average more than the market and below 1 moves on average less than the market.

Cut-off: Deadline for remittance of orders to the transfer agent in Luxembourg as set out in the relevant annexes to the prospectus. You may be required to submit your orders to your financial advisor or fund distributor by an earlier cut-off time.

Correlation and annualised volatility: Correlation shows how a fund's return moves in relation to the benchmark. Highly correlated investments tend to move up and down together while this is not true for investments with low correlation. Standard deviation or annualised volatility is a measure of historical volatility. It is calculated by comparing the average return with the average variance from that return.

Maximum drawdown: The largest loss measured from peak to trough until a new peak is attained.

Ongoing charges (OCR): Ongoing charges are based over 12 months of expenses ending the 31 December of the previous year. It is annually updated, but may be adjusted more frequently.

Sharpe ratio: The Sharpe ratio shows the fund's risk-adjusted performance. It is calculated by dividing the excess return (portfolio return minus risk free return) by the volatility.

Tracking error: The volatility of the fund's excess returns over its benchmark returns. It quantifies how closely a manager's return pattern follows that of the benchmark.

Derivatives risk: Certain derivatives could increase Sub-Fund volatility or expose the Sub-Fund to losses greater than the cost of the derivative.

Counterparty risk: The Sub-Fund could lose money if an entity with which it does business becomes unwilling or unable to honor its commitments to the Sub-Fund.

Management risk: Portfolio management techniques that have worked well in normal market conditions could prove ineffective or detrimental during unusual conditions.

Credit risk: Prices of a debt security may fall if the issuer's creditworthiness deteriorates, or if investors believe it may do so. This risk tends to be greater with lower quality debt securities. In extreme cases, an issuer's securities could become worthless if it fails to make timely debt service payments.
